Year 2 have been developing their Super Scientist skills this week by doing some research. They discussed the different ways that we can research and choose two methods to use. Pupils spent time reading facts about the importance of trees, or David Attenborough's life, from information sheets and researched information on the internet using our amazing Chromebooks.



Fractions can be a tricky concept to understand. This week, 3B have been very successful at learning all about fractions as they now know the denominator is the amount that a number has been divided by and the numerator is the number of groups there are. They know that 1/4 of 20

is the same as 20 divided by 4. Well done 3B.



This week, year 5 had the exciting delivery of some class stick insects. They are studying the life cycles of insects, so having these living insects is an amazing opportunity for them see the different stages as they happen.



This week, our wonderful Historians in 5B expanded and deepened their understanding of the English Civil War. They collected a range of primary and secondary sources to help build a picture of what life was like for the citizens of England during this important moment in our nation's history. The maturity and sophistication of the questions that the children asked during our lessons was astounding and led to a brilliant drama

activity in which some of our children played the roles of a family who had been torn apart by split allegiances to the King and the Parliamentarians. Mr Gale was immensely proud of their interest in this complex topic and their ability to use evidence to inform pertinent inferences about the people who lived through these devastating times. This week in Year 6, the children have been learning about the WWF's Living Planet Report as part of their Biodiversity topic. Year 6 will be using their research to generate an information pack for younger children on how to protect the health of our planet. I can't wait to read these packs.
