This week, pupils in our Nursery have been learning about birthdays as part of their Celebration topic. Pupils shared the different ways they celebrate birthdays at home and designed patterned wrapping paper. They used their developing counting skills to count out colourful pompom cupcakes and candles on playdough cakes.

Pupils in RW have had a very exciting week. As part of their light and dark topic they have been exploring

shadows and how they can use a light source to make their own shadows. Pupils also enjoyed painting pictures in the style of Mark Rothko.

In RB the pupils have been exploring light and dark in different ways. This week, as well as learning about nocturnal animals, they were inspired by the work of Mark Rothko. The pupils used a primary paint colours to investigate how adding lighter or darker tones can change the shade of the colour.



This week, pupils in Year 1 have been investigating which material is best for mopping up a spill, after Miss To clumsily knocked over some water. They designed an experiment to decide which type of paper to use and talked about which one was the most absorbent. Pupils made some very interesting observations and compared their results to their initial prediction.

Pupils in 2B have been learning about Food Chains. I was very impressed with their knowledge of herbivores and carnivores. They worked very well in partners to look at food chains.

In Year 2, pupils were very confused when they started playing a game with absolutely no rules in RE. They soon reflected on how important it is for us to have clear rules that we can all follow, so there is fairness for all and to avoid chaos. This important discussion was part of their learning in RE this half term on Rules and Laws. Pupils had many questions for Miss Mieville at the end of this session before playing the game again. They realised how much better it was when everyone understands what the rules are.





Pupils in 3B have been exploring the holy books for Islam and Judaism. They learnt that the holy book for Islam is called the Qur'an, which it is written in Arabic and is read from right to left. Pupils also learnt that the holy book for Judaism is called the Torah, which is hand-written and rolled up on one long piece of paper called a scroll.



In Year 3, pupils discovered who lived in Roman Britain by participating in the popular game "Guess who?", where they needed to ask specific questions to predict and work out which Roman Briton their partner was. It was a fantastic activity and everyone learnt so much.




Year 4 had a fantastic time at the British Museum. Pupils used iPads to follow a treasure hunt which lead them to artefacts found in the Sutton Hoo discovery. After 'collecting' items on their iPads, pupils collected facts on each artefact before challenging themselves by completing a quiz on their new learning. A great time was had by all. Sincere thanks to all the helpers who came with us and to Mr Abraham for organising a superb experience.

In 5LT, pupils learnt all about the roots of democracy in their Ancient Greek

lesson this week. They had their own chance to recreate an Ancient Greek democratic assembly. The class were introduced to several real situations

that occurred in Ancient Greece and were tasked with democratically arriving at a decision as to how the assembly should respond. At the end of the lesson, the people of the assembly even voted to 'ostracise' two archons who decided against the rule of the people - a real Ancient Greek democratic tradition!





Pupils in Year 6 visited Lavender Hill Magistrates' Court to develop their knowledge of the criminal system and how law is enforced. In one of the courtrooms, they played out a scripted mock trial, taking the roles of the Chair, Solicitors, Crown Prosecutors, Prosecution Witnesses and more. Afterwards, Year 6 were given the opportunity to ask any further questions and ended their visit with a tour of the now unused cells below. Year 6 were articulate with their reading and asked lots of interesting questions.

In English lessons this week, 6B have identified techniques used by Christopher Edge, the author of our focus book 'The longest night of Charlie Noon'. This included building tension and atmosphere using ominous language, focusing on purposeful dialogue and varying sentence length for effect. 6B then incorporated these features in their own retelling of the famous tale of Little Red Riding hood ensuring to add more haunting and spooky descriptive language than the original children's story.

On a Wednesday morning, we welcome pupils who have signed up for our Basketball Club. Mr Butler was very pleased this week at the amount of shots that were going in through the net when playing various games. This is a result of their commitment over the past month.

Mr Butler will be heading back home to Australia in a week. We have just loved having him teach PE at BWA and will miss him immensely. We know that he will be sorry to leave BWA as he heads back to be with his family after his time living in London. I am sure you will join me in wishing him the very best of wishes for the future. Mr Butler will be handing over to our new PE teacher, Mr Sanfilippo next week.


Communication

Information on Measles / MMR vaccination – message from the NHS

Measles cases are rising across the country, with over 102,000 children starting primary school in England being at risk of catching the disease. We are asking education settings to share key messages from the NHS about MMR / measles and how to get vaccinated.

Measles is highly infectious and if left unvaccinated nine out of ten children in a classroom can catch the disease if just one child is infectious.
