Here are some of the highlights of our week together.



Life is very busy for pupils in our Nursery: they have letters and numbers to learn; pictures to paint; crafts to make; blocks to build; places to run, jump and climb and a whole space station to run! But there's no one better for the job. They love keeping busy: answering the phones, taking messages, checking the spaceship and, when they are dressed for the part, blasting off into space for an epic mission. This week they heard the story "Whatever Next?" by Jill Murphy and learnt about a little

bear who had a picnic on the moon. A perfect idea for their next trip in the spaceship.

Pupils in RW have had another wonderful week in Reception. They have been writing fact files about sharks. Pupils have a wide range of knowledge about the sea creature and articulated their shark facts in front of their peers very clearly and confidently. Using mixed media, they have been creating their own seabed.

This week pupils in RB have been making amazing art for the PTA exhibition. It has been wonderful to see their development of pencil control as they make beautiful Eiffel towers and have had lovely discussions about what the real one looks like from



the pupils' own experiences. They are very keen to see them in a frame like a grown-up artist.



On Tuesday, our Year 1 classroom was transported back in time to the Victorian era. They had a teacher form the Victorian era teach them for the day so they could learn more about this time. Pupils explored different kinds of toys from over 130 years ago, made their own one and even conducted an archaeological dig to find more historical artefacts. We were very impressed with the enquiry skills used to suggest different uses and purposes of the things they found in the sand.

Pupils in Year 2 started their new English text 'There's a Rang-Tan in my bedroom' by James Sellick. They really engaged with this

moving story which raises important topics such as deforestation and endangered species, particularly the orangutan in the Indonesian rainforest. Year 2 discussed what action can be taken to combat this significant challenge. They will be writing persuasive letters to Cadbury's to encourage them to stop using palm oil in their chocolate and to suggest alternative solutions.





During the week, our resident artists had a wonderful time with pupils in 2B. As you can see from this photograph, the pupils created awesome cosmic artwork. They used a variety of media including poster paint, watercolours and colouring pencils and employed a range of artistic techniques such as blending and stippling, create these amazing 3D pieces of a rocket.



Pupils in Year 3, we have been continuing to learn more about Fractions. It has been great to see their confidence

and ability increase in this subject and see them solve difficult equations independently. Pupils also finished writing their own short stories, which they wrote using Krindlekrax as inspiration. It has been brilliant to see their stories begin to differ in length and incorporate a wide range of descriptive language.

3B have been exploring more about what life was like during the Stone, Bronze and Iron Ages. As such, they participated in a role-play session using Now Press Play to immerse ourselves in prehistoric times. Top highlights included making a fire, hunting woolly mammoths, digging in a mine and discovering wooden housing.



Our Year 4 pupils have started their final writing focus of the year, based off the movie Oceanmaker. The pupils have watched short clips of the film, predicted what it will be about, what the heroes mission will be and written incredible setting descriptions of this barren wasteland.



This week, the pupils in Year 5 said their goodbyes to the butterflies. Pupils learnt that insects can have different types of life cycles: complete and incomplete metamorphosis. The butterflies were an example of complete metamorphosis - the insect changed completely from caterpillar to butterfly. Whereas stick insects, for example, experience incomplete metamorphosis - the young resembles the adult and change gradually.

Hopefully some of the beautiful butterflies will stick around to thrive around our garden planters.

This week, our Year 6 pupils sat their end of KS2 SATs examinations. Every morning, pupils came in ready to take on the challenge. They were provided with snacks and juice in the morning before the tests took place to keep their energy and focus high and we could not be prouder of their resilience. They were able to showcase all that they have learnt at primary school and deserve a well-earned rest this weekend. Well done Year 6!



Pupils in 6B have also shown great resilience throughout the SATs week. They have greatly enjoyed creating their Olympic themed art as a way of expressing their creative skills. They used watercolours, white charcoal pencils and colouring pencils to create their pieces and they look forward to sharing them with our families at the upcoming Art exhibition.



This week we played in a Wandsworth tennis tournament. Our representatives put in a fantastic effort, despite the pouring rain all morning. They finished top of the table in Group B. Group B then drew in the semiand dead heat finals went to a unfortunately we then lost which resulted in BWA in coming 3rd. It was an incredible effort by our BWA pupils. We are so proud and cannot wait for another chance to play together. Lastly, thank you to our parent helper Daisy, she was a fantastic support.



Information on Measles / MMR vaccination – message from the NHS

Measles cases are rising across the country, with over 102,000 children starting primary school in England being at risk of catching the disease. We are asking education settings to share key messages from the NHS about MMR / measles and how to get vaccinated.
