# **Music: Building Skills and Creating Harmony**

Year 5 and Year 6 pupils have come together to form a 'mega choir,' working hard on challenging medleys and harmonies as part of a special Vocal Project. Their enthusiasm and dedication have been inspiring. This project is a testament to the strong foundation our younger pupils are building in music—starting in Nursery, right through to Year 4, pupils are honing their listening, singing, and music-making skills,

all of which will contribute to the choir's success.

## **Exciting First Hand Experiences and Enquiry Approaches**



In Nursery, our pupils have been learning about firefighters, crafting their own fires and practicing how to put them out with pretend equipment. Ferdie was especially fascinated by the special masks firefighters wear to help them "breathe healthy air."

Pupils in Reception drew their favourite dinosaur freehand before painting them. Drawing them was very tough as pupils used card

and couldn't trace. When they were painting their drawings, everyone made sure they cleaned the paintbrushes with water before using another colour. Their works of art will go up for display on their Dinosaur Topic board.

Pupils in our RB have been having a blast with their topic on traditional tales. They have retold the story of the



'Three Little Pigs,' using their voices to bring the characters to life. One of the highlights was planning and designing a 'wolf-proof' home, with ideas like slides, tunnels, and lookout goggles—each more creative than the last. It was wonderful to hear them animatedly describe their ideas.


Year 1 welcomed a very special guest this week: Mr. Underwood, Bea's dad, who spoke to the class about renewable energy. The pupils learned about wind, solar, and water power, and how these sources help protect our planet. To top it off, each pupil received a toy octopus, the mascot of Octopus Energy. We are always excited when parents can share their expertise with the pupils, and we hope more will join us for future talks.


Pupils in Year 2 have been learning about the importance of staying healthy, including a hands-on exploration of germs and hygiene, while also developing their math skills by comparing temperatures around the school.

Year 2B have been diving into Roald Dahl's *The Twits*, exploring the characters in-depth and writing their own descriptions of Mr Twit's appearance and personality.

In Science, pupils in 3B explored the fascinating process of rock formation, learning about the three main types of rock: igneous, sedimentary, and metamorphic. Through a hands-on experiment using Starburst candy, they recreated the rock formation process, bringing a scientific concept to life in a fun and engaging way.

Year 3 have had a fascinating week in history, exploring Ancient Egypt. Pupils





Year 5 have been exploring the world of climates and biomes this week, learning about the Earth's main climate zones and their

features. Pupils were eager to understand how these zones shape ecosystems around the globe.

This term in science, 5B are learning about reversible and irreversible changes. To investigate how we can separate mixtures of solids, the class were given a mixture of different materials and a range of different equipment to separate with. Pupils found out about sieving, magnetism and hand sorting methods and then used them to separate

pasta shapes, flour and paper clips from the maths counters.

Our eldest pupils, Year 6, have been deeply engaged deeply with the topic of migration, discussing push and pull factors—why people leave one country and why they are drawn to another. A particular point of interest has been visas, with many pupils curious about the legalities of international movement, even prompting their teachers to share their own visa experiences!

This week has been filled with incredible learning experiences, and it's clear to see that our pupils are not only expanding their knowledge but also developing vital skills for the future. As always, thank you for your continued support in helping our pupils succeed.
