

3rd March Newsletter

What an exciting week this has been. We have had a great start the second half of this term with excellent learning, wonderful educational trips as well as Pancake Tuesday followed by Ash Wednesday and then World Book Day on Thursday. It must be nearly time for the first weekend in March!



Pupils in our nursery really enjoyed their trip to the fire station yesterday. They looked at the different equipment on the fire engines and saw the firefighters' uniform. Our pupils listened carefully to the firefighters as they explained their job and told them how they helped people. Thank you to Miss Malone for organising this great experience and for all the parents who joined us for the trip.



This week pupils in RB started designing an emergency vehicle that they will create over the term, these include; air ambulances,

RNLI boats, police boats and fire engines. The designs are wonderfully colourful and

detailed and show how the pupils are developing great observation skills. It has been great to see them applying their knowledge of repeating patterns when creating the features of the vehicles. Well done RB.





As part of their Traditional Tales topic, RW were very fortunate to go to the Polka Theatre to see The Gingerbread Man last week. They travelled by bus, holding hands with their partner and wowing the public with how well behaved and sensible they were. Everyone watched the production and listened carefully for story language! To help them when they write their own

stories. Thank you to Miss Ward for organising the trip and for the parents who so kindly helped us on the day.

This week RW have started an experiment. They have planted four sunflower seeds in different conditions. 1. No water 2. No soil. 3. No light. 4. Water, soil and light. Pupils made predictions about how well the sunflower seeds will grow and will watch them over the next few weeks filling in their Sunflower Diaries to record their observations.





Pupils in Year 1 have been exploring how Clapham Common has changed over the last century. They used different sources of information to find out how Clapham Common has changed. Year 1 are becoming fantastic historians are improving their ability to identify reliable and unreliable sources.



Year 2 had a fabulous start to the half-term, launching their new Science topic exploring what makes Earth special and learning

about the planets in our solar system, also linking to their English topic inspired by Mae Jemison's incredible achievements. They particularly enjoyed watching a rocket launch in a star-lit classroom.





2B started their new topic all about habitats in science this week. On Monday, they went for a walk to Clapham Common to see different habitats and micro-habitats.



Year 3 launched their new geography topic by exploring where different kinds of fruit and vegetables are imported from. They used their excellent map skills to identify the countries on an atlas and then enjoyed sampling some of the fruits.

3B were excited to dress up as their favourite character during WBD. They read a selection of books and enjoyed researching more about Nigeria, where the author Atinuke is from. She has written wonderful books such as Amazing Africa and No 1 Car Spotter. Pupils will use the facts they collected to write a fact file about Nigeria.





A highlight for Year 4 this week has been investigating the role that bacteria plays in the decomposition of food. Pupils are using their scientific enquiry skills to observe the effect it has on bread over time - a few days in and there is a lot of mould already.



This week, pupils in Year 5 have enjoyed the start of their PSHCE topic which is all about keeping healthy and safe. Pupils have discussed the ways in which they keep themselves safe and healthy. They thought about how they can ensure they remain healthy with plenty of sleep, eating a variety of fruits and vegetables as well as taking regular

physical activity.

6B have started to read the brilliant novel 'Holes' by Louis Sachar in English this week. The pupils have been making excellent predictions about what they think will happen next!



As part of their English unit to write a news article about a sports event, Year 6 had a zoom session with a news journalist from The Guardian. He talked them through the process of writing a news piece and the key features that should be included. He also spoke about the differences between a news report and a sports report. There was also time for a question and answer session at the end. It has generated some brilliant pieces of writing. A fantastic opportunity.



World Book Day

Across our school, on Thursday 3rd March, our wonderful school community celebrated World Book Day. The day started with the brilliant sight of many of our pupils entering school dressed as their favourite characters from some of their favourite novels. We know that you all had a busy morning getting your children ready and the huge effort you put into the costumes they wore – you did the most amazing job. Thank you for making this such a special day for them.



Throughout the day, it was a real pleasure to see the genuine love of books and reading manifest itself through whole class reading, watching videos of famous children's authors reading extracts from their own novels and the sharing of reactions after reading our whole school book of choice to celebrate the day, **Change Sings by the poet**

Amanda Gorman. A beautiful book of poetry and illustrations, all framed around the theme of positive change for the world, it was heartening to see how dedicated to changing the world for the better our pupils are. All in all, it was a great day. Thank you to all who made it so memorable.

<u>COVID 19</u>

The regulations have been changing as we learn to live with COVID19. Our procedures in school remain in place to ensure the educational provision is not affected. We ask that parents continue to wear masks in

the line as you don't know who you are standing beside in the line who may be vulnerable or live with someone who is or who is infectious as this has happened this week at BWA. All parents invited onto the school site will be expected to wear a mask.

There have been a few positive pupils and staff cases this week at BWA and we are monitoring one class who have a few cases. I am sure you will join me in wishing everyone who has the virus a very speedy recovery.

We ask that all families continue to adhere to the following expectations.

1. No-one with symptoms should come onsite. The list of symptoms linked with COVID 19 has increased to include, shortness of breath, fatigue, loss of appetite, muscle ache, sore throat, headache, stuffy or runny nose, diarrhoea, nausea and vomiting. Any of these symptoms may also have another cause.

2. Take a test if you have symptoms. See the guidance <u>here.</u>

If a parent or carer insists on a pupil attending school where they have a confirmed or suspected case of COVID-19, schools can take the decision to refuse the pupil if, in our reasonable judgement, it is necessary to protect other pupils and staff from possible infection with COVID-19.

- 3. Close contacts should follow the advice set out by the NHS guidance relevant at the time.
- 4. Pupils who test positive for COVID return after two days of negative lateral flow tests as set out by the NHS guidance relevant at the time.
- 5. Wear a mask when on the school site or in the line for drop off or collection.



Supporting pupils, and families, with the news of the war in Ukraine
